2. Long COVID under Section 501 and the IDEA: A Resource to Support, Children, Students, Educators, Service providers & Families 7/26/21

The COVID-19 pandemic has created significant challenges for schools in meeting the needs of all children and students in early childhood, elementary, secondary, and postsecondary education. These challenges will continue as schools and public agencies¹ seek to ensure support and equity for children and students experiencing the long-term adverse health effects of COVID-19, commonly referred to as long COVID.



This resource is issued jointly by the U.S. Department of Education’s Office for Civil Rights (OCR) and the Office of Special Education and Rehabilitative Services (OSERS) to provide information about long COVID as a disability and about schools’² and public agencies’ responsibilities for the

provision of services and reasonable modifications to children and students for whom long COVID is a disability.

3. Questions to Consider when Accessing Relief Funds Information Sheet

The Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act (CARES Act), the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSAA), and the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) offer state education agencies and other organizations an opportunity to access temporary funding. ARPA, specifically, will provide local districts with funds to address appropriations, mental health, and teacher shortages. The purpose of this document is to offer questions to consider when accessing the temporary funds to ensure services for transition-age students and youth with disabilities are represented in planned activities. The audiences for this resource are state education and vocational rehabilitation leadership, local school district and agency partners, family organizations, and advocates.

5. The Benefits and Costs of Apprenticeship: A Business Perspective

The basic components of apprenticeships are the same today as in 1937, when the National Apprenticeship Act set the foundation for apprenticeships in the United States. Apprentices enter a structured training program of classroom and paid on-the-job training under the guidance of a mentor. As their skills increase, so do their wages. Upon completion of the program, apprentices earn an industry-recognized credential and usually are hired into a job that marks the start of a career. The payoff for workers is clear: 91 percent of apprentices find employment after completing their program, and their average starting wage is above \$60,000.¹



Because of these positive results, the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) has invested \$265 million since 2015 to expand apprenticeships. Many states are increasing funding for technical assistance, tax credits to employers, and career and technical training to prepare students for apprenticeships.²

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Office for Civil Rights and Civil Liberties (CRCL) has developed this Guide to assist DHS personnel, contractors, and grantees in their interactions with people who have disabilities. Under the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended, DHS has a legal obligation to ensure nondiscrimination in the employment of people with disabilities as well as by providing program access, physical access, effective communication, and reasonable accommodation to people with disabilities encountered and

served by DHS programs and activities. Examples of these interactions include people with disabilities who are traveling through the airport, crossing into the U.S. at a point of entry, naturalizing to become a U.S. citizen, being held in detention awaiting a hearing or removal, and receiving assistance before, during, or after a disaster.

Ensuring nondiscrimination often begins by practicing effective methods for interaction, such as treating individuals with respect and using appropriate language. **This document offers a summary of disability myths and facts, guidance on appropriate language, and tips for successfully interacting with people who have disabilities.**

28. Eviction Moratorium Rent & Utilities

If you're looking for help with rent and utilities, you're not alone. The CDC issued a **NEW** eviction moratorium on



August 3, 2021, temporarily halting evictions in counties where COVID-19 is spreading rapidly. If you gave your landlord a declaration by July 31, and it's still true, you are still protected from eviction for unpaid rent until October 3rd, 2021. If you need help and have not submitted a declaration, this new CDC moratorium may help you avoid eviction, but you must take action.
